



Recognition of EU Professional Qualifications Guidance

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Introduction

Your right to EU recognition is determined by the EU legislation on recognition of professional qualifications¹ which supports the free movement of professionals across the EU. This route is therefore suitable for EU-qualified civil engineers seeking ICE membership in order to work in the UK.

This guide will help you find out if you have a right to recognition, what you need to do and how the application process works. Please note the following:

- You must be able to communicate effectively in English to use this route. All application documents and assessments must be completed in English, and the ability to communicate well with others at all levels in English is a key competence required for Engineering Council registration.
- Even if you are eligible for EU recognition, you can choose to qualify by ICE Professional Review instead. This may be of particular interest if you are already training with ICE, or if you are planning to work outside the UK now or in the future. This is because agreements to facilitate registration with other institutions usually require members to have qualified directly and not on the basis of recognition.
- The civil engineering profession in the UK is covered by the general system of recognition. This does not result in automatic recognition and we still need to assess whether your knowledge, skills and experience satisfy the standards for ICE membership and Engineering Council registration at the relevant grade.
- Because of the nature of protected titles awarded by Chartered bodies, any application made to ICE will be for permanent establishment – applications for provision of temporary service are not required in the UK.
- Unlike some other EU member states, registration with ICE and the Engineering Council is voluntary and is not required by law in order to pursue the profession of civil engineer in the UK. There are [very few activities reserved](#) to holders of our protected titles. You may therefore use your existing professional title (in its original language) whilst working in the UK and there is in general no restriction on the right to practise as an engineer in

the UK. However you cannot use the [protected titles](#) of CEng MICE², IEng MICE³ or EngTech MICE⁴ without ICE membership and Engineering Council registration.

- Applications for EU recognition cannot be used to progress from one grade to another. This means that if you achieve IEng MICE by this route you cannot subsequently use this route to apply for CEng MICE. This is explained further in question 5 of the [Frequently Asked Questions](#) at the end of this document.





Am I eligible to apply for EU recognition?

You must be able to communicate effectively in English to use this route. All application documents and assessments must be completed in English, and the ability to communicate well with others at all levels in English is a key competence required for Engineering Council registration.



What is the application process?

If the flowchart above indicates that you are eligible for this route, you should also confirm with your home member state that you have a right to EU recognition of your professional qualification before you begin your application. The section below, **Evidence of the formal qualifications**, explains how to do this.

You can submit an application at any time. We will process your application within a month and confirm if your application is complete and ready for assessment. If there is any missing information we will tell you and will not proceed with the assessment until it has been received.

The assessment itself may then take up to four months. During this time [your name](#) will be published on [the ICE website in accordance with Admission Procedure 3](#) for 28 days, to notify others of your application for membership.

All applications for recognition are assessed and approved for admission by ICE's Exemption & Recognition Panel, who are qualified members and experienced ICE Reviewers.

Once your application has been assessed, you will receive a decision letter by email from the Panel. If your application is successful you will be approved for membership and admitted following payment of your subscription fees. If your application is not successful we will explain why, and you may have to undertake a compensation measure in order to achieve the protected title. Compensation measures are explained in more detail below.

Making an application

Before you start, you will need an ICE membership number. If you don't already have one, please create a non-member account by registering with [MyICE](#). This will enable you to make payments online and access information on our website tailored to your particular interests. You will find your membership number within "My Profile" in your [MyICE](#) account.

Once you are registered, please take the time to complete the diversity section in "My Profile". This is explained in more detail below.



What do I need to submit?

- **A completed [application form](#)** for recognition of EU professional qualifications. This should be submitted by email to erp@ice.org.uk, with all supporting documents in one single PDF no larger than 5mb.
- **Declaration of any unspent conviction** – You will be asked to confirm in your application form that you have informed ICE if you have an unspent conviction relating to a serious criminal offence (please refer to the application form for details). You will also need to provide evidence from your home member state that you are not suspended or prohibited from practising your profession. This is explained in the section below on Evidence of formal qualifications.
- **Payment of the application fee.** Please [pay online](#) before submitting your application. You will be asked to log into your [MyICE](#) account before being redirected to the secure payment system. If you are unable to pay online, please contact our Membership Services team for alternative ways to pay⁵.
- **Diversity data.** ICE is fully committed to valuing and representing the diversity of our members and applicants. As part of your application, you will be asked a few questions about your background to help us achieve this. We recommend that you submit this data directly online within “My Profile” of your [MyICE](#) account. The information you provide will only be used in an aggregated form and you will never be individually identifiable. You can opt to decline to answer each or any of the questions if you wish. [Find out more about ICE’s equality and diversity policy.](#)
- **Proof of nationality.** You will need to provide a certified copy⁶ of your passport or identity card.

Certified copies⁷ of your academic qualifications/diplomas and certified translations⁸. In some cases (usually when your qualifications are not accredited at the level you are applying for) we may also ask you to provide copies and translations of your course transcripts/mark sheets and a brief summary of your final year project/dissertation.

- **Evidence of the formal qualifications** that give you access to the civil engineering profession in your home member state. Please refer to the section below for how to obtain this. Your evidence should be dated within 3 months prior to submitting your application and included with your submission or emailed directly to erp@ice.org.uk by the relevant competent authority. Please note that the EUR ING title is not a formal qualification or regulated professional title for the purposes of recognition.

Three independent statements from senior professional engineers in support of your application. They should describe in their statements how they believe you have demonstrated the required level for each attribute. At least one should be a qualified Member of ICE. The others may be qualified with another Engineering Council-licensed institution, European or International professional engineering body, and can be a current or previous colleague or client. The Panel welcome completion of the [Recognition sponsor questionnaire](#) in lieu of a statement if your supporter would prefer to use this, please make sure these are included with the rest of the documents when making your application and not sent separately (as it states on the sponsor questionnaire).

- **Evidence of your current professional competence in the field of civil engineering.** If you are applying for CEng MICE or IEng MICE, please use the [Attribute achievement form](#) to provide this evidence. For EngTech MICE, please use the [Technician Standards achievement form](#). Your form should be read and signed by at least one of your supporters to verify the evidence you are providing.

All evidence submitted must be your own work. Please refer to the guidance on plagiarism and collusion in the relevant form and in [ICE's code of professional conduct](#).

- The information you provide about your professional experience is very important because it tells us how you have achieved competence in each of the member attributes. Attributes are the standards that all ICE applicants must demonstrate to achieve their chosen grade of membership. The panel will be looking for practical examples of how you have achieved the required level of competence for each attribute.
- Please include all your evidence within the form itself. You should provide no more than 3 pages of evidence per attribute, which can include embedded diagrams or images if they help to demonstrate your competence. With effect

from 1 January 2020 no additional appendices should be submitted. If you go over the maximum 3 pages your application may not proceed to assessment.

- If you have an active training agreement or mentor-supported training with ICE, or if you have previously applied for an ICE career appraisal, you must ensure that this has been completed or cancelled before you make an application for EU recognition. In most cases it will be more beneficial to you to complete your training first. Please contact erp@ice.org.uk for further advice if this applies to you.
- If you have recently qualified in your home member state, please be aware that only the professional experience you have gained since obtaining your formal qualifications can be submitted as evidence of your professional competence within this application.
- **CPD records.** We recommend that you also include a current record of your [continuing professional development](#) (CPD) with your application, as this will help the Panel to make their assessment. Your CPD record includes a development action plan (DAP), outlining your training objectives for the next 12 months, and a professional development record (PDR) for the last three years. Please download our [CPD guidance](#), which includes templates for your DAP and PDR.
 - All qualified members must be able to submit an annual CPD record to ICE on request so this will help you to prepare for that commitment. If you provide your DAP and PDR in this format you do not need to list your training and development activities within the application form as well.

Evidence of formal qualifications

You will need to provide evidence of the formal qualifications that give you access to the civil engineering profession in your home member state. This depends on whether the profession of civil engineering or the professional title that you hold is regulated or unregulated in your home member state.

You can check the status of your profession or professional title by searching the [European Commission regulated professions database](#).

If you are still unsure of the status of your professional qualification, please check directly with the National Contact point/National Assistance centre for your home member state. Their contact details are listed at the bottom of the EU webpage on [free movement of professionals](#).

IF THE PROFESSION OF CIVIL ENGINEER IS REGULATED OR YOU HOLD A PROTECTED TITLE IN YOUR HOME MEMBER STATE:

You must provide evidence from the relevant competent authority confirming:

- That you are entitled to use that title and date of registration/award
- That you have a right to recognition under directive 2005/36 and at which level: 11(e), 11(d) or 11(c)
- That you are of good character and have not been suspended or prohibited from the pursuit of that profession for serious professional misconduct or a criminal offence⁹.

IF THE PROFESSION OF CIVIL ENGINEER IS UNREGULATED IN YOUR HOME MEMBER STATE:

You must hold academic qualifications which prepare you for the profession of civil engineering and you must have practised the profession of civil engineer on a full time basis for one year out of the last 10 years (or equivalent duration on a part time basis) in your home member state **OR** you must have completed “regulated education and training” for the profession of civil engineer in your home member state.

You will need to provide evidence from your home member state’s **National Contact Point/National Assistance centre** confirming:

- That you have a right to recognition under directive 2005/36 and at which level: 11(e), 11(d) or 11(c)
- That you have the relevant qualifications and length of experience in your home member state; **or** that you have completed “regulated education and training” for the profession of civil engineer
- That you are of good character and have not been suspended or prohibited from the pursuit of that profession for serious professional misconduct or a criminal offence¹⁰.

Compensation measures

When we assess your application, if we find any substantial differences between the knowledge, experience or competence that you have demonstrated and the required member attributes for your chosen grade you will not be approved for membership at that stage. You will be told what those differences are and you can choose whether to undertake a compensation measure to continue with your application.

In some cases you may also be given the option to submit additional written evidence to address the differences (or shortfalls) identified by the Panel. If you choose to do this your evidence will be assessed again by the Panel, which may take up to a further four months. If any shortfalls still remain you will then have to take a compensation measure to continue by this route.

A compensation measure can be either an 'aptitude test' or an 'adaptation period'. You won't be made a member until the compensation measure is successfully completed.

Compensation measures can only be undertaken in the UK. If you are living outside the UK when you apply, you will have to travel to the UK for an aptitude test or wait until you are working in the UK to begin an adaptation period.

Aptitude test

This is a face-to-face interview with two experienced ICE Members. It gives you the opportunity to show that you have the required knowledge, experience and competence that wasn't demonstrated in your application. It will be arranged at a mutually convenient date and location.

There is an additional fee for the aptitude test. Please check our [application fees webpage](#) for details.

The aptitude test will last up to 75 minutes and will focus on the attribute(s) that have been identified as a shortfall in your application. You may begin with a presentation (of no more than 15 minutes), to help to demonstrate that you do possess the attributes in question.

If you don't pass the aptitude test, you'll be given the reasons why in writing. You may make a new application for EU recognition or by another route, but you must ensure you have addressed the reasons given for your failure of the aptitude test when you make your new application.

Adaptation period

An adaptation period helps you gain the knowledge or experience you need to meet the required level of competence for your chosen grade.

This will usually be a period of supervised work as a civil engineer in the UK. It may also be a recommendation that you undertake further learning or education, if that's the best way for you to gain the required knowledge or competence.

We'll appoint an ICE trained supervisor to monitor and assess your progress. They'll submit a report on the skills or knowledge you have gained to confirm when you have reached the required level of competence for approval by the Exemption & Recognition Panel.

There is an additional fee for the adaptation period. Please check our [application fees webpage](#) for details.

The adaptation period may last up to three years, depending on the amount of knowledge and the range of skills you need to gain.

Gaining your protected title

Once you have been approved for membership, you must pay your fees within three months of admission or your ICE membership will be cancelled and you won't be registered with the Engineering Council.

Your annual ICE subscription fee will be pro-rated depending when you join. Your first Engineering Council fee will be an entry fee which includes your first year's registration. Payments for both fees are made to ICE. Please check our [subscription fees webpage](#) for the current costs.

You'll be sent your membership and registration certificates separately by ICE and the Engineering Council. [Providing you select the tick-box on the application form, if you are successful your name will be published as a newly qualified member on the ICE website](#) and subsequently on the [New Civil Engineer website](#).

Once you are a member, you are required to abide by ICE's By Laws and [code of professional conduct](#). This includes maintaining your [continuing professional development](#) records which

are subject to annual monitoring and review.

If you don't keep up payments of your annual subscription for ICE membership and Engineering Council registration, your membership will lapse and you will no longer have the right to use the title of CEng MICE, IEng MICE or EngTech MICE.

If you do lapse your ICE membership then want to reinstate it at a later date, you will have to follow the same [reinstatement process](#) as a qualified UK national member.

Appeals

If you are not happy with the decision we make about your eligibility to apply for EU recognition, please address your complaint to ICE's Head of Qualifications at membership@ice.org.uk.

You may also contact the [UK National Assistance centre](#) for advice.

If your application for membership is unsuccessful and you wish to appeal, please consult the [ICE Appeals guidance](#).

If you believe there has been a misapplication of EU law by ICE, you may submit a case to the [SOLVIT](#) office in your home member state. SOLVIT is an EU-wide network that seeks to informally resolve such cases.

Frequently Asked Questions

1. What will happen to this route now that the UK is leaving the EU?

2. What will happen to my ICE membership and Engineering Council registration gained through this route now that the UK has left the EU?

As ICE qualified membership and Engineering Council registration are global professional qualifications and are not linked to nationality or location, any member that has achieved MICE and Engineering Council registration, by whatever route and wherever they are in the world, will retain that status provided they maintain their subscriptions and remain a Member in good standing.

3. Are there any limitations to the work I can do as a civil engineer in the UK if I qualify by this route?

The profession of civil engineer is unregulated in the UK so there is no requirement to be registered in order to practise. There are [some specific activities which are reserved to licensed or approved persons \(e.g. Chartered Engineers or equivalent\)](#), but these are not generally defined by the route by which the license or approval was obtained. We are not aware of any limitations on signing or approval of works based on the route by which your UK professional qualification was achieved.

If you are informed that there may be limitations on what you can do in the UK as a qualified member of ICE, please check the original wording of the documents/forms which specify the qualification requirements and confirm your eligibility with the relevant body directly. If you are told that you do not meet the criteria please inform us at erp@ice.org.uk so that we can investigate further.

4. Will my UK professional qualification be recognised in other countries?

All professionally qualified members are assessed to the same standards for their chosen grade. Your professional qualification will have the same status with the public and with employers whatever route you qualify by wherever you are in the world. However, obtaining your qualification on the basis of recognition (rather than directly by Professional Review) means you may not be able to use your UK professional qualification to register with other

engineering institutions or registration bodies, in the UK or internationally. This is because most agreements facilitating registration with other institutions require the applicant to have qualified directly with their home institution, to avoid what is known as “daisy-chaining” (which is applying for further recognition on the basis of titles already obtained through recognition).

If you intend to apply for registration with another body or in another country after you have qualified in the UK you should seek advice from that body as to whether or not they will recognise your UK professional qualification if it is obtained by EU recognition.

5. What if I would prefer to sit a Professional Review instead?

Any potential member or graduate member with a right to apply for recognition can choose to apply by another appropriate route if they prefer to. We recommend that you consider your options carefully before you make an application for recognition and you may find it useful to discuss your choice with your nearest ICE membership development officer.

If you hold an 11(e) qualification which is the equivalent level to CEng MICE, you may choose to join ICE by taking the Professional Review first for IEng MICE or EngTech MICE, and subsequently apply for CEng MICE by this route.

However, applications for EU recognition cannot be used to progress from one grade to another. For example if you achieve IEng MICE by this route you would subsequently have to apply for Chartered Professional Review (progressive route) to achieve CEng MICE.

If you qualify with ICE on the basis of EU recognition, but later decide you want to sit a Professional Review for the same grade, you will need to resign both your ICE membership and Engineering Council registration in full then apply for Professional Review. In this circumstance you would not have to complete an ICE training agreement or career appraisal.

6. I have confirmed that I am eligible for EU recognition, but I could also sign up to IPD online to start an ICE training agreement or mentor-supported training, what should I do?

We recommend that you check your current experience and competence against the requirements in the Attribute achievement form. You are entitled to make an application for EU recognition immediately, but if you do not yet have enough experience to demonstrate competence to the level for your chosen grade, you will have to complete a compensation measure (adaptation period). If there are small gaps, you may prefer to manage your own development to address the gaps, and then apply directly for EU recognition. If there are large

gaps, we recommend that you use IPD online to structure and support your professional development. Once you have completed your ICE training you will have the option to apply for EU recognition or Professional Review. You may find it useful to discuss this with your employer and/or your nearest ICE membership development officer.

7. I have confirmed that I am eligible for EU recognition, but I am already signed up to an ICE training agreement/mentor-supported training – can I apply for EU recognition now?

If you are undertaking ICE training with the support of your employer or a mentor, this usually means you do not yet have enough experience to demonstrate the competence for a successful application to ICE for your chosen grade (by any route). We therefore recommend that you complete your ICE training first, as this is the best way to ensure you get the range of experience required. You can then choose whether to apply for EU recognition or proceed to Professional Review. You should discuss your options with your employer or mentor, and/or your nearest ICE membership development officer.

If your eligibility for EU recognition was not established or confirmed before you started working in the UK, please contact erp@ice.org.uk to check your eligibility before proceeding. You should also be aware that only professional experience gained since obtaining your “formal qualifications” in your home member state can be submitted as evidence of your professional competence by this route.

8. I have an EU professional qualification, but my academic qualifications are from outside the EU/European Economic Area – can I use this route?

This will depend on the “evidence of your formal qualifications” provided by your home member state. The relevant legislation requires that your academic qualifications must have been recognised by your home member state and that you must have subsequently had at least three years’ professional experience in that member state to be eligible for recognition.

If the competent authority in your home member state confirms you meet these criteria then ICE will accept your application.

9. Is EUR ING a regulated professional title?

No. EUR ING is a voluntary professional title awarded by FEANI (the European Federation of Engineering Associations). FEANI is not a member state competent authority, it is made up of national members from within and outside the EU, so not all EUR ING will be EU citizens and

may not have a right to recognition under the directive.

The EUR ING title is not listed as a regulated profession or protected title for the purposes of the directive so cannot be the basis for your right to recognition – this will depend on your professional status in your home member state.

10. Can I apply for partial access to ICE's protected titles?

The option of granting partial access to a regulated profession was incorporated into the relevant legislation in 2016, however, because of the nature of Chartered bodies' protected titles in the UK and because ICE does not authorise practise in separate fields or specialisms of civil engineering, it is very unlikely that partial access based on your specialism would be required or could be granted by ICE.

You may however apply for recognition at a lower level i.e. if you hold an 11e qualification (the equivalent level to CEng MICE) you can apply instead for IEng MICE or EngTech MICE.

Any individual request for partial access will be considered on a case-by-case basis by ICE and should be made directly to erp@ice.org.uk before preparing or submitting an application.

If you are not currently practising in the field of civil engineering as it is defined in the UK, you may be more suited for registration with one of the Engineering Council's other licensed institutions in a different or more specialised field of engineering. These are listed on the [Engineering Council website](#).



Appendix A – How to certify copies of documents and English translations

Copies of your qualification documents can be certified by:

- The competent authority that issued the document
- Your university lecturer
- A senior member of your employing company
- A solicitor
- A corporate ICE member (qualified MICE or FICE).

They must write the following statement in blue or black pen directly onto the copy of the document:

“I confirm this to be a true copy of this applicant’s qualification”



English translations of your qualification documents can be certified by:

- The competent authority that issued the document
- An official translator
- Your university lecturer
- A senior member of your employing company
- A solicitor
- A corporate ICE member (qualified MICE or FICE).

They must write the following statement in blue or black pen directly onto the translated document:

“I hereby certify that I translated this into English and that, to the best of my ability, it is a true and correct translation. I further certify that I am competent in English to render and certify such translation”
